Mathew, a well-known sportsman, of Rydons, Talaton, took place yesterday in presence of a large gathering of relatives and friends. The cortege left the residence of deceased at two o'clock and was met at the church by the Rector (Rev. J. H. Bradford) and Rev. C. Sherwin, of Clyst Hydon, who officiated. The hymns sung were "Peace, Perfect Peace" and "Let Saints on earth in concert sing." Miss H. Payment presided at the organ, and while the mourners assembled rendered "Rest in the Lord," and as the cortege left the church, the Dead March in "Saul." Mentally Defectives' Welfare: Urgent Need for an Institution: The annual meeting of the general committee of the Bucks association for the Care of the Mentally Defective has held at the County Hall, Aylesbury on Tuesday, when there were present: Mr. J. M. Knapp (chairman, who presided), the Marquis and Marchioness of Lincolnshire, Mrs. Pinsent (member of the board of control) the Hon. Mrs. James ...

An Address: Mrs. Pinsent accepted an invitation to address the meeting, and she expressed thanks to the Association for the valuable work it did. She knew from personal experience, she said, the difficulties that were to be met at every turn; many of them inherent in the nature of the cases with which they had to deal. They often arose from the unstable and excitable condition of the parents of the cases. There were great difficulties owing to defects in the Acts of Parliament under which they worked. There was the ever-present difficulty of obtaining money for the maintenance of the defectives, and there was the final difficulty of obtaining vacancies in any existing institution even for the most urgent cases. In the face of all these difficulties it was really marvellous how the Association persevered and commanded admiration. Before they could cope with the mentally defectives, they must have a farm or colony for every county, or combination of counties. The act of 1913 imposed on the borough and county authorities an obligation to find institutional accommodation, but the intervention of war had rendered many things impossible of accomplishment. Also, while war destroyed many of our best citizens, it left mentally defectives almost untouched. Emphasising the

characteristics essential to the successful institutional treatment, Mrs. Pinsent said that with the acquisition of workhouses and other buildings already in existence the Associations looked forward to classification and effective treatment of patients, and better opportunities for training and employment. She appreciated the impossibility almost of building new places or colonies at the present time, but existing buildings could be adapted – whether a fair-sized country house or an empty country workhouse. There were some essentials to be borne in mind. There should be sufficient land in proximity to permit farming and gardening. The minimum amount of land which the Board of Control required for that purpose was 1 acre to every 20 patients. Combined action by local authorities would tend to better classification and economy. About 1 per 1,000 of the population would require care and treatment in a colony. Thus Bucks, with a population of 219,000 would require 220 places. Berks, 193, Oxon, 136, Oxford City about 52, and Reading about 87. All these authorities combined would require 689 places. If five authorities could not combine, two neighbouring authorities might do so, and invite others to send their cases under contract. At the instance of the Marquis of Lincolnshire, a hearty vote of thanks was accorded Mrs. Pinsent for her Address ...

A Dangerous Practice: Motorist Fined at Newton: At Newton Abbot Police Court on Tuesday before Mr. J. C. Chapman (in chair), William Parkhurst, 18, Torquay-road, pleaded not guilty to driving a motorcycle to the danger of the public in the Torquay Road, on May 9th. Eric Ross Foster, clerk, Exeter, stated that at 11.30 a.m. on the day in question he was driving his motorcycle towards Torquay, and was passing a trap going in the opposite direction when another motorcycle cut in between. Witness's handlebar was struck, his glove being torn, and his knuckles grazed. The other vehicle, which was proceeding at a speed of about 18 miles an hour, did not stop. Donald Pinsent and Bernard C. H. Wakefield, both of Newton Abbot, gave evidence, identifying Parkhurst as the motorcyclist. Defendant said he did not see the oncoming motorcycle until he endeavoured to pass the trap and then it was impossible to stop in time. He considered that he was properly complying with the rules of the road and would have stopped had he been aware that the other motorcyclist was struck. The Bench considered the practice a dangerous one and imposed a fine of £1 with costs.

The father, with knowledge of his son's bankruptcy, and the fact that he was undischarged, made a will and devised two-tenths of the residual estate upon trust to the bankrupt for life, or until became bankrupt. The question arose whether there was a forfeiture, seeing that the debtor was bankrupt at the time the will was made. Judgment had been given in the Chancery Division that there was a forfeiture. Therefore, it seemed clear that he (the Official Receiver) had no claim on the two-tenths. Applicant was engaged by his father as an assistant brewer and was rescued from disaster by his father on three or four occasions. He was quite sure that if the accumulation of debts had been avoidable, he would never have allowed the case to come into Court. Mr Templeman, for the debtor, said that if it had not been for the clause in the will debtor would have been able to pay the whole of his creditors in full. Every effort had been made to get the bankruptcy annulled, but one of the trustees was not a consenting party. There was no suggestion that the debtor had led a wild life, but for many years prior to his bankruptcy he was unable to work owing to illness. He had also suffered a great deal since through ill health. Under the will it was assumed that the debtor's wife would receive income of about £6 a week, and he was quite willing that Mrs. Pinsent should assist in paying the debts. His Honour Judge Terrell said that under the will there was a discretionary trust, and the trustees could apply the income under the will for the benefit of the husband, wife, or children. Difficulties arose, as under the will the trustees had discretion about the allocation of the money and might change their minds from time to time. The discharge would be granted but suspended for two years. Leave was given to the debtor to again make an application to the Court for discharge at any time during the two years if he was able to make an offer that would meet the approval of the Official Receiver.

A Father's Will: Sequel at Exeter to a Newton Bankruptcy: Son's Application: At Exeter County Court yesterday, Mr. A. Harold Ward (Official Receiver in Bankruptcy) mentioned the application made at the December Court by William Henry Pinsent, of Newton Abbot, for his discharge in bankruptcy. The application, he said, was at that date adjourned in order that another application might be made in the Chancery Division on the instruction of the will of the applicant's father. The latter had knowledge of his son's bankruptcy and that he was an undischarged bankrupt when the will was made. The father devised under his will to the Trustee two-tenths of the residuary estate upon trust for the bankrupt for life or until "he should become a bankrupt." The question arose as to whether there was forfeiture seeing that the son was already bankrupt at the time the will was made. Mr. Justice Lawrence had decided

that question in the affirmative. Therefore, it seemed to be clear that as an officer's trustee of the bankruptcy, he (the Official Receiver), had no claim on the two-tenths of the residuary estate. Consequently, the application of the debtor had now to be dealt with. Applicant, added the Official Receiver, had been engaged by his late father as an assistant in the brewery. The father had rescued the son from financial disaster on three or four occasions. SEVERAL REASONS AGAINST DISCHARGE: The Judge said there were several reasons against discharge, one being that debtor had not paid 10s. in the £. Mr. T. J. W. Templeman (for the debtor) said his client had been anxious to pay his debts in full. He attempted to get the bankruptcy annulled, the sole difficulty being that under the will there was a discretion for the executors to pay the wife and children. If the children had been 21 years of age there would have been an annulment, and there would have been sufficient to pay 20s. in the £ and interest. The difficulty was to get sufficient security for the raising of the necessary money. There was also the fact that one of the trustees was against and would not assist. There was a legacy of £100 which in the ordinary way would have been claimed by the Official Receiver. The executors, however, claimed a lien on the £100 because the testator had paid an overdraft at the bank. It was suggested on behalf of the debtor (he added) that the £100 should be used to enable him to obtain his discharge, and they should not press their claim for the overdraft. That would have enabled the payment to the creditors of 10s or 12s in the £. Since the Chancery Court had declared there was forfeiture that had fallen through, debtor being left in a worse position in regard to the bankruptcy than he was when the application was made, and when was endeavouring to pay his creditors in full. The executors were not represented that day. Debtor was formerly in his father's brewery earning £10 month, and had a wife and two children: GRANTED, BUT WITH TIME LIMIT: His Honour pointed out that he was precluded under the section of the Act from granting the discharge. The Official Receiver said his Honour had discretion to grant a discharge in the event of debtor consenting to judgment for the payment of a substantial payment. His Honour said he could not make an order which he knew would be futile. Mr. Templeman asked his Honour would grant debtor his discharge in the event of the wife being able to save £100. His Honour replied that it would be competent for an application to be made again. Ultimately his Honour granted the discharge, but suspended it for two years, giving leave to Mr. Templeman to apply at any time for the order to be varied.

Whitstable Congregational Young People Society: The Society had on the 7th inst. great pleasure in listening to a lecture by Mr. A. Pinsent, M.A., B.Sc., of London on "The Future of Motive Power" which gave those present valuable information and much to think about. The lecturer at the beginning said that his aim was to show how absolutely dependent industry was on some cheap prime mover. For the last 150 years all the resources of this country had been directed towards manufacturing and the present age might well be called the machinery age. The success of any industry depends upon any material that can be converted into fuel, and that material at present is coal. Now coal, as everyone is aware, has taken millions of years to form. Already we are using it much faster than it was made, and the consumption is increasing, which means that if continued our coal supply will not last more than another 150 years. Our

engineers and chemists, knowing this, are trying to find a lasting substitute, and owing to their efforts we are just beginning a time when coal is being displaced. The American coal price has been reduced because at the present time they have plenty, but the English coal price has increased, our coal being less plentiful and more difficult to get and is the cause of some of our industrial problems. In an open grate heat and by-products are wasted. The gases given off coal if properly treated will give the basis nearly 2,000 chemical substances. This is already being done in some gas works. Again, we have the same trouble with oil. A few years ago, America exported oil, now she imports it and it is said that oil may not outlast coal. What appears to be one solution to the difficulty is the development of waterpower electricity schemes as is done in Switzerland. One disadvantage we have in England is the lack of hills to give "head" or force to water to drive machines, but it is interesting to note that schemes such as the Severn and Thames barrage are put forward. When coal is burned, we get a chemical reaction, certain atoms of coal join certain atoms of air which generates energy in the form of heat. Radium and similar bodies split up into smaller atoms thereby generating heat: can it be harnessed? A wide field for exploration: It is quite easy to see that a country that does not get ample supplies of fuel cannot keep its place in industry. In fact, unless it gets a constant cheap supply it cannot carry on. The Statesman's duty at present is to ensure this supply. The Peace Treaty might well be called a coal treaty, as many of the clauses have reference to coal or other fuel. Unless this question of fuel and motive power is settled, we cannot hope for freedom from war. It's quite possible that in the future a commission may be formed to ration raw materials that all nations need.

Inspector's Report: With the report were presented reports of Mrs. Pinsent, a Commissioner of the Board of Control, who inspected the Institution, and of an Inspector of the Board who visited the Earlswood Home at Walton-on-Naze. In her report, Mrs. Pinsent stated that the general health of the patients seemed to have been good. She was particularly pleased to see the very great improvement that had been made in the classification and organisation of the schools. A certificated head teacher had been appointed, and she and her staff were to be congratulated on the marked progress which had been made during the last eight months.

There was evidence of much hard work and enthusiasm, and the timetable and syllabus of work showed considerable thought and knowledge of the needs of defective children. She was very glad to observe that a nursery school had been opened, in which 30 children were being trained, many of whom were formerly doing nothing in the wards. This school was well equipped and was staffed with nurses who were superintendent and trained to teach by the head teacher. The boys' school, which was now used mostly for adults, or boys unfitted to attend the mixed schools, had been reorganised on better lines. Attempts to teach ordinary school subjects had been wisely relinquished, and the boys, most of whom were low grade cases, were learning bed-making, sweeping, dusting, polishing, rug-making, basket work, and spoon and fork cleaning. Since efforts to teach this kind of simple manual work had been more definitely organised, it had been possible to pass on several boys to the various household employments, and even to send one or two to the workshops. She was glad to hear from Dr. Caldecott that there was to be a gradual extension of laundry training for the girls and also a gradual introduction of gardening and other industries. Now that the schools were making such good progress, she felt sure there would be better supply of manual workers when the children grew up, and trusted every effort would be made to break down the prejudice which she was told still existed on the part of parents that manual work was degrading for paying patients. She would like to see a larger number of patients employed in the workshops. The Matron, who was formerly at Starcross had started a class for lacemaking, and she saw four at work who were making good progress, and who appeared to be greatly interested. Others in the same room were doing good needlework. Lectures, classes, and demonstrations had been organised for the nurses and attendants, and it was hoped that many of them would take the Medico-Psychological Examination. Dr. Caldecott had arranged to allow medical students from the London Hospitals to visit the Institution, where classes and demonstrations were held for them. On the motion of the Chairman, the report was adopted.

He was District Scoutmaster at Islington for some time, and then became Chairman of the Kingston Association, his troop, the 1st Tolworth, having gained the Kingston proficiency flag for the best all-round troop for two years in succession. Care of Defectives: Annual Meeting of Surrey Association: Discussion on the Hostel Scheme: The annual meeting of the Surrey Voluntary Association for the Care of Defectives was held on Thursday afternoon of last week, at 84, Eccleston Square, London, S.W., Col. the Hon. A. G. Broderick (President) was in the chair, and the attendance included the following: ...

Two Definitions of "Hostel": Mrs. Hume Pinsent, Commissioner of the Board of Control, said that the Mental Deficiency Act would be a dead letter if it were not for the Voluntary Associations. She was afraid that the idea of Hostels formulated by the Board of Control was a little different to that presented by the Association, but she thought they could come to some arrangement. Boys and girls who would always be feeble-minded and would always want some of the kind care which a mother gave to a child were kept in one institution for six or seven years, with the result that they got stale (hear, hear). They wanted a change and a less confined life. With benefit to themselves and to the community they might be transferred to a Hostel, where they would get affection and motherly care. A Hostel, in the mind of the Board of Control, meant home for trained cases, but Surrey had in mind a small, certified institution where cases which were giving trouble could be trained. If Surrey were going to have such an institution, the Board would be glad if they would not use the word "Hostel," as the Board were

trying to monopolise that word for their idea. She was sympathetic with Surrey in trying to establish such an institution. The danger of sending defectives straight to a Hostel from their homes and allowing them to go out to daily work however was that those in charge of them would not be familiar with their tendencies as would be the case of those defectives who had been in an ordinary institution for six years. A girl who was unstable and had an erotic temperament should not be sent out to daily work. The difficulty would be to get jobs for the defectives, but she was glad to hear that the Association had approached some factories and had hopes of work being found. Some cases which would not be very good in domestic service would make good factory hands. FACTORY WORK v. DOMESTIC SERVICE: Mrs. Le Personne expressed the opinion that it would be dangerous to put the girls into factories and thought they would be better and happier in service. Mrs. Pinsent stated that a forewoman would take them to and from the factories. The girls were most likely to come to disaster in service, as mistresses could not keep their eyes on them all the time. Domestic service was appalling for the number of girls who came to disaster. ...

The whole place was beautifully clean, and patients nicely dressed, and the day rooms most comfortably furnished. The patients were friendly and responsive, and the women were delighted to give me an exhibition of their dancing and singing. I have seldom seen happier and more contented patients. The observation wards, to which the patients are sent on admission, were bright and cheerful, and there was an entire absence of noise and excitement. There has been no restraint since the last inspection, and the use of the padded room is only recorded on four occasions. The patients are obviously well nursed and treated with kindness and sympathy." Mrs. Pinsent also mentioned that "during the last five months 170 patients have been admitted to the mental wards, and 111 of these, 'were sent on to a mental hospital'. The average time which 109 of these patients spent in the mental wards of this Poor Law Institution before transfer to a mental hospital was 4-6 days. The remaining two stayed for longer periods; they were at first certified under "Section 24 of the Lunacy Act."

Mental Deficiency Problem: Gift for Promoting Research: An offer of £5,000 for the purpose of promoting research at, Cambridge University, by studentship otherwise, into any problem which may have a bearing on mental defects, diseases, or disorders has been made by Mrs. Hume Pinsent and Sir Horace and Lady Darwin, says the "Birmingham Post." In a letter to the Vice-Chancellor the donors say they believe the racial and social problems involved by the existence of large numbers of mentally incapable persons in the community are of great national importance, and that their solution may have far reaching effects. They to give the money in memory of the following persons: Hume C. Pinsent, scholar and fellow of St. John's College; Erasmus Darwin, exhibitor of Trinity College; David Hume Pinsent, scholar of Trinity College; and Richard Parker Pinsent, exhibitor of Balliol College, Oxford. If a studentship is founded, they intimate that they would like it to be open to either sex and suggest that it be called the Pinsent- Darwin Studentship. Mr. Hume Chancellor Pinsent, who died at Foxcombe Hill, near Oxford, four years ago, was well known in Birmingham as a member of the firm of Messrs. Smith, Pinsent, and Co. solicitors. Elected to a foundation scholarship at St. John's, Cambridge, in 1876, he had a distinguished career, graduating fourth wrangler in 1878. In Birmingham Mr. Pinsent did good work in connection with the Midland Institute and the University, and on his retirement from business 1913 was a member of the Council of the latter body. The details which led up to the acquisition of the property have already been published, and following the extensive alterations carried out from the designs of Sir George H. Yesterday's opening ceremony was performed by Dame Monica Wills, widow of Mr. H. H. Wills. J. Cooke Hurle. Ernest Price, chauffeur, of Elm House, Crosby Road, Liverpool, said on the 21st June he was driving a six-seater saloon car along the Torbay Road in the direction of the Grand Hotel. Just after crossing the entrance to Belgrave Road, he saw a lady and gentleman on his near side stepping off the pavement. They were about twenty-five yards away from him. A tram car which was in front of him and going in

the same direction, was just slowing up and it ultimately came to a standstill. Witness put out his hand to indicate to anyone coming from behind that he was going to slow down. He then saw through his mirror that a motorcyclist was approaching from behind. The cyclist passed him and got in between the tram and witness's car, which was then stationary. The left handlebar struck the lady and knocked her down. Joseph Hingham, of Highcroft, Haldon Road, Torquay, said at the time of the accident he was a passenger on the tram referred to. He saw the lady and gentleman on the footpath signal the approaching tram to stop. They left the pavement and the tram stopped. The next thing he saw was a motorcyclist going along in the rear, occupying the middle of the road, and he appeared to be going very fast. Baron Bernard Van der Werff, of Eversfield, Warwick Road, Solihull, Birmingham, said he and his wife were walking along the Torbay Road on the seaside, in the direction of Paignton. They signalled to the train to stop but noticed there was a car following the tram. As the car was going very slowly, they attempted to board the tram, when the cyclist cut in and knocked his wife down. Witness admitted that a certain portion of the road was obscured from his view by the on-coming motorcar. His wife was taken to the hospital in an unconscious condition. P. C. Burnett said the width of the road at the point was fifty-four feet, and the width between the pavement and the tram lines on the seaside was twenty feet. Defendant said on the day of the accident he was on business for his employer, whose motorcycle he was riding. He came out of Belgrave Road and saw the motorcar some distance behind the train. There was no other traffic on the road at the time. As he got level with the motorcar the lady and gentleman walked out in front of it and he (defendant), after striking the lady, collided with the train, which was travelling slowly and was only pulled up after the impact. He sounded his horn but saw no signal given by the driver of the motorcar. After the impact he had pulled up within two yards. He was travelling at twelve to fifteen miles per hour. Mr. Easterbrook submitted that there had been no question of "cutting-in." They were entitled to a tramcar on the side that appeared safest. At least, that was his interpretation of the law as far as Torquay was concerned. The safest in that case was undoubtedly the near side. If he had passed the tram on the other side, he would run the risk of colliding with any traffic coming in the opposite direction. In America there were people known as "Jaywalkers," who stepped off the pavement without seeing or knowing what was coming. There were also weird notices at certain points stating the number of people that had been killed there, and strongly advising people to be careful in crossing the road. Motorists and pedestrians had an equal right to the road. but he was convinced that before long legislation would be passed which would lead to foot passengers being convicted for walking to the common danger. The law had too long been inclined to regard the pedestrian as always being in the right and the motorist in the wrong. In that case the defendant had been taken by surprise. His vision was obscured by the motorcar, and the fact that he pulled up in two or three yards showed that he was not travelling at an excessive speed. The Bench imposed a fine of £2 and costs and ordered the defendant's licence to be endorsed.

Mental Welfare: Over 600 delegates attended the two-day Conference organized by the Central Association for Mental Welfare and evinced very lively interest in the consideration of the problems of Borderland cases, the proper care of mental defectives outside Institutions and the aftereffects of encephalitis lethargica. Miss Ruth Darwin, in pleading the urgent need for more institutional accommodation, emphasized the fact that there were still about 88 per cent of the total population of mental defectives outside institutions with no adequate provision for their home-training and occupation. Mrs. Hume Pinsent and others dealt with the question of sterilization. While admitting the efficacy of it as an additional safeguard in a comparatively few cases, any idea of it as an alternative to segregation was strongly deprecated. Mrs. H. P. Macmillan, chairman of the Royal Commission on Lunacy, and subsequent speakers urged the adoption of the recommendations of the Commission with regard to the early treatment of cases of mental disorder, thus avoiding, very frequently, the necessity of certification. England at present is far behind America, Germany, and Italy in this respect. Dr. Tredgold of the Bethlem Royal Hospital, dealt with the mental and social aspects of the now prevalent disease of encephalitis lethargica, and the pressing need for special institutional accommodation for the treatment and care of sufferers from it. The number of children in whom a very marked moral degeneration has taken place as a result of the disease is beginning to constitute a very real problem in delinquency. By arrangement with the Metropolitan Asylums Board provision has been made for the care of 100 children under years who have developed mental and moral sequelae consequent on an attack of the disease. The experiment is being watched with great interest, but it is too early to make any deductions yet.

There are at present three men inspectors and one-woman inspector; the men each receiving from £500 to £800 a year, and the woman, £400 to £650. The salaries of the two women now to be appointed will be £500 to £650. For years the Women's Freedom League has urged that there should be Women Inspectors under the Board of Control. It is essential, since there are more women than men in mental hospitals, and the great majority of nurses are women, that there should be women to inspect these hospitals and that women inspectors should be available for making investigations into complaints which may arise in connection with their administration. We urge, also, that there should be more women Commissioners of the Board of Control. At present there are, in addition to the Chairman, Sir F. J. Willis, two unpaid men Commissioners and one unpaid woman Commissioner, Miss R. Darwin; six paid men Commissioners and one paid woman Commissioner, Mrs. E. F. Pinsent. Neither Miss Darwin nor Mrs. Pinsent is a medical woman. Story of a Piano: Yeovil Ex-Manager Sent to Prison: 23 years' Service: James Pincet, late manager in the employ of Messrs. Godfrey and Co., piano merchants, Middle-street, Yeovil, appeared on remand at Yeovil Police Court, yesterday, on a series of charges of alleged falsification of accounts. Mr. Boxall prosecuted, and the accused was represented by Mr. T. Mayo. Mrs. Tucker said on March 17th, 1925, she purchased a piano from Messrs, Godfrey and Co., the price being £42 cash. The instrument was delivered a day or so later, and she paid £2 and later £40, on or about March 27th. There was never, at any time, anything said about a hire purchase system. No arrangements were made to pay £1 5s monthly. As far as she understood, when she paid the £40 that completed the payments. At the end of June, she received a telegram signed "Godfrey," from Exeter, stating that he would call. Pincet called, and he then gave her a receipt for £40. Mr. R. Robbins, salesman to Messrs. Godfrey and Co., said, on the instructions of accused, he delivered a piano to the last witness. She told him to call in about a week's time, which did, and received £40 which he handed to accused. James Henley Breeze, chartered accountant to Messrs. Charmers Wade and Co., of Yeovil, said he had examined the book of accounts of Messrs. Godfrey and Co., but could find entry of £40 on or about the day mentioned. An entry of £2 was, however, there. Witness said the sum of £40 should have been included with the takings for that day. In a ledger under the hire and purchase system, was an account in the name of Mrs. Tucker in which there was a charge for a piano £57 15s. There was also a credit entry of L.34 10s paid by monthly instalments of £1 5s. There was no entry of credit for the £40 mentioned. Mr. W. H. Watson, of Hornsey, London, secretary to Messrs. Godfrey and Co., said Pincet had been in the firm's employ for twenty-three years, and had been at Yeovil for the last eight years. His salary was £10 per month and commission on all sales, rent and rates of house free. In answer to Mr. Mayo, the witness said at the end of the financial year, ending March 31st, 1927, accused had received the sum of £343, and the previous year L.393 in wages and commission. Witness, continuing, said he could find no entry of any amount for £40. The book containing the counterfoil of the receipt produced could not be found. Miss Gladys Robbins identified her handwriting in the different ledgers. Mr. Mayo, for the accused, desired that the case should be dealt with at that Court. Mr. Boxall stated that he would be prepared to withdraw the case of Lombard as it was very complicated. Mr. Mayo pleaded guilty on behalf of the accused to the other six charges. The other cases were then dealt with, the total amount alleged to have been embezzled being £205 19s. According to the evidence, the accused's methods were to get customers to sign a blank form which he himself filled in later. When completed they were hire-purchase forms agreeing to monthly installments. Mr. Mayo said this had been going on for the last two years. The difficulty in these cases was knowing when to stop. When Mr. Watson came, the accused disclosed everything to

him and had given his firm every assistance since. Accused was sentenced to a month's imprisonment on each charge, the sentences run consecutively.

He also received another order on 15th March, and sent a quantity of honey to H. Laxter, 1, Cromwell Street, Mill Lane, Leicester and was never paid. A further order came on April 13th and honey valued £9 6s was dispatched to John Davenport Hume, grocer, and contractor, 201 Belgrave Gate, Leicester. Other orders were received on May 17th for honey valued at £9 6s., sent to John Hulme, Junior, dairyman, 2, St. Marks Street, Leicester. Paid Out Commission: He had a letter then from Wadsworth intimating his change of address to 1 Cromwell Street and witness wrote asking for assurances as to the accounts he had opened and in reply Wadsworth said that some of his customers were finding the sale of honey slow, but he promised to get the accounts settled. Witness had paid Wadsworth L 2 15s commission in respect of the orders. In no case was he paid for any of the honey sent. Traders' Retort: Henry Wood, a London tea and coffee merchant, gave evidence of appointing Wadsworth by letter as an agent, and of the orders received from him. Wadsworth: Were not my terms with you 5 per cent. commission? I haven't had any commission from you. Witness: Yes, 5 percent. upon the payment of the account. - I haven't had any money from the customers. Mrs. Sarah Malin, The Farm, Rearsby, who has a stall in Leicester market, said Hulme came to her and offered to sell her honey. She bought four cases at 10d per lb., paying £6 in all by cash. The honey was delivered by Rearsby. She had never before bought honey. The accused were remanded for a week, bail being granted to Hulme and Pinsent in £20 each. Mr. H. G. Bennett defended Hulme and Pinsent.

Shattered Courtship: No Actual Engagement: Reason Why Fishponds Plaintiff did not Succeed in an Action: How a Bristol courtship was wrecked was told to Mr. Justice Rowlatt, in the King's Bench Division yesterday, when George Thierry Pinsent, a widower, of The Retreat, Winterbourne, alleged that his sweetheart, Miss Lily May Jefferey, a waitress at the Victory Cafe, Fishponds, Bristol, had given him up owing to slanderous statements made regard to him by Ronald Francombe, Frampton Cotterell. The words complained of were that the plaintiff had invited a married woman to go to London with him for a week and that he could have saved his wife's life if he had cared to do so. Plaintiff accordingly claimed damages slander, but the

defendant denied using the words complained of. Mr. C. W. Jacobs (instructed by Messrs. Pomeroy and Son) for the plaintiff said that for several months prior to August 1927, he was courting Miss Jefferey. On August 24th she and her mother arranged to visit him on the following Sunday, but in the meantime, the defendant called at the cafe and made to Miss Jefferey the statements complained of with the result that the appointment was never kept, and all relations were broken off. Miss Jefferey repeated to several persons the statements made to her by the defendant, and the plaintiff accordingly brought action against her, but it was settled by an apology. His Lordship: "Was it breach o' promise?" Counsel: "No; slander." Counsel went on to state that the action resulted in the disclosure of the defendant's name as the person who made the statements, and accordingly a writ was issued against him. Defendant's reply was an absolute denial that he ever used the words complained of. Plaintiff's Story: Plaintiff, giving evidence, said that his wife died in 1925, and a doctor attended her up to the time of her death. In 1927 he kept company with Miss Jefferev, with a view to marriage. When she and her mother failed to keep the engagement to visit him on August 27, he wrote to the young lady for an explanation, but could not get any reply. The friendship had never been renewed and Miss Jefferey was now being courted by someone else. Mr. Jacob: "And so your chances are lost? ": Plaintiff: "Yes: they are gone altogether". Mr. E. H. C. Wethered (instructed Messrs J. W. Ward and Son), for the defence, asked "Were you engaged?" – "I was not actually engaged." Miss Jefferey in the witness-box, said that the defendant went to the cafe and said to her "if you knew what I do about Mr. Pinsent you would not keep company with him." Defendant then made the statements complained of. "I never went out with Plaintiff after that or answered his letters." added Miss Jefferey. The Judge: "You did not inquire whether there was any truth to the statements?" Witness: "I did not." His Lordship: "It isn't wise to assume that everything you hear about people is true." Mr. Wethered: "You know now that these statements about the plaintiff were untrue, but you have not renewed courtship with him?" – "No; because I am courting someone else." Mr. Jacobs said that the damage caused was that the plaintiff had lost his marriage. The Ruling: His Lordship said the action could not possibly succeed. If these words were used, the plaintiff was very badly treated but the action could not succeed unless actual damage could be shown, or a criminal offence was imputed. If there had been an actual engagement, and it had been broken off by the alleged slander, it would have been different. Therefore, the action must be dismissed with costs.

A Leicester man, suspected of receiving hosiery and selling it in county markets – Ernest Pinsent (40), 13 Archdeacon Lane – was sentenced to six months hard labour at Leicester today, on a charge of receiving hosiery stolen from a railway dray. A mysterious figure, referred to as "George" was alleged by the defense to have foisted the goods on to Pinsent. Under Suspicion: "For some time," said Detective Superintendent Boon, when sentence was passed, we have had numerous robberies from railways. This man has been under suspicion for some time. At his house was found other hosiery made by the same firm which cannot definitely be identified as being from their parcels. Pinsent stands in the local markets, at Melton, Hinckley and Coalville and can dispose of the goods." Before the evidence was heard, P.C. Goosey, in the witness box, recalled that he was in court on June 17th of last year when Pinsent was convicted of receiving five dozen pairs of hosiery. Edward Ashford Billingham, a carter, said he collected a parcel of jumpers from Billson's hosiery works, placed it safely on his dray, and then found that it had gone when he reached the depot. Det. Sergt. Turner described an interview he and Det. Inspector Clowes had with Pinsent at this home in Archdeacon Lane. He told Pinsent that he understood that parcels had been delivered at his house, and sked him if he would now say what was in them. Pinsent said there were no parcels delivered. He was then asked to account for some Hosiery found in the front room, and he replied: "A man brought them here last night, I don't recall that hosiery." A Man Brought Them: The jumpers were identified, and Pinsent was charged with stealing and receiving. "A man brought them and offered them for 30s a dozen. I said if they were any good, I would pay them on Friday," he replied. Pinsent, in court, described himself as a market trader. The man who brought the jumpers, he said, was a casual acquaintance known as "George" ... *(continues at length)* ...

Mr. Bennett suggested that "George" "Had the wind up," and was anxious to dump his stolen goods on someone. He foisted them on to Pinsent, who had reason to ask where they came

from because he had only arranged to look at them. Millstone Around His Neck: "One starts a case of this kind with a millstone around the neck" Mr. Bennett continued. "A previous conviction had been quoted in court and therefore the defense started in a bad light. It was not for him to criticize – it was the law. But a man once convicted was not bound to be criminal for the rest of his life; often he decided that the game was not worth the candle." Stating that "if there were no receiver there would be no thieves, Sir Jonathan said the magistrates felt justified in imposing the full sentence.

"for some time," he said "we have had numerous railway robberies, and this man has been under suspicion for some time. At his house was found other hosiery made by the same firm which cannot, however, be identified as stolen. Pinsent stands in the local markets at Melton, Hinckley, and Coalville and can dispose of the goods." Sentence of six months' imprisonment with hard labour was passed. The magistrates were Ald. Sir Jonathan North (in the chair). Mr. J. G. Pickard, Mr. A. Oram and Mr. Alec Tyler.

Two Lorries In a Big Crash: Ashburton Inquiry: Remarkable evidence of the results of a dispute between two lorry drivers was given at the resumed inquest at Ashburton yesterday on Billie Charles Harrington Marsden, aged 42, of 14 Holland Road, Brixton London. Marsden was killed near Ashburton last Saturday, when he was crushed between the lorry he was driving and another lorry belonging to his own employers, Messrs. A. W. Meteyard, Langdale Road, Thornton Heath. The second lorry was driven by Clifford Ridley, Birchanger Road, Woodside Green, London, who was exonerated from blame. It was stated that deceased and another driver were under the influence of drink. A verdict of "Accidental Death" was recorded: Would Not Let Him Pass: Mr. E. Hutchings, coroner, conducted the inquiry, and Mr. R. J. McGahey represented the employer, and Col. R. E. Tucker the widow. Cecil Albert Jackson, King Street, Newton Abbot, said while driving a car from Wrangaton to Paignton he passed a lorry between South Brent and Marley Head. It was being driven in a proper fashion and was going in the same direction as he was. Shortly afterwards he came upon another lorry, which he endeavored to pass, but the driver pulled out into the middle of the road and would not let him go by. It wobbled all over the road, but after about a mile witness passed it, and in doing so looked at the driver, who appeared to be drunk, and was rolling about in the cab. Gerald Swain Pinsent, Tarraway Road, Paignton, who was with the previous witness considered the second lorry they passed was driven very dangerously. Harry Steere, Plymouth, said he stopped at the London Hotel, South Brent, and noticed two lorries outside. In the bar he found the two drivers, who, in his opinion were both under the influence of drink. Deceased went out in the passage and used disgusting language and knocked off his friend's hat on several occasions. Witness left the hotel and eventually found a policeman, who he asked to stop the lorries being driven, as he was afraid there might be an accident. Walter Rowland, Dean Prior, said he was sitting in his house when he saw a lorry stop on the wrong side of the road, another following. The driver of the second lorry, who was in court, leaned out and asked witnesses' children for some flowers, which they gave him. The deceased, alighting from his vehicle, picked up a bucket filled it with water, staggered across the road and threw it over the steering wheel and the driver of the other lorry, who did not even speak. Going To Fight: William Steer, of Wrangaton, a steam roller driver, said at the Kingsbridge Road Hotel, the two drivers offered him a drink, and he was invited to go for a ride. He accepted and rode with deceased. The Coroner: How did he drive? Quite all right, so far as I could see. Did anything unusual happen? No. What was the driver's condition? He seemed in a fit state to drive. When they arrived at the Half Moon Inn, Ashburton, outside which the driver was killed, deceased said that he was going to fight the other lorry driver and took off his coat. The Coroner: Why did you not tell the police in your

statement that the man wanted to fight? In your statement you give the impression that he was perfectly sober. Were you trying to hide anything? Witness: I don't want to hide anything. He admitted that the driver put his arms around his neck. The Coroner: It is greatly to be regretted that when you knew he wanted to fight that you didn't take his arm and try to lead him away. Constable Gould, who saw the accident, said when the vehicles collided there was a tremendous crash. After the driver got out, he acted in a very distracted and excitable manner and said: "I have killed him. Look at my radiator. My God, what can I do? Let me cry." Dr. S. W. Williams said that death was due to internal injuries and took place on the way to hospital. In his opinion the other driver was not incapable of driving through the influence of alcoholic liquors. Ridley said he was returning from Plymouth to London. The tow lorries left together at 12 noon. They had a drink each, witness having a pint of beer and his companion a bottle of cider. About 2 o'clock they had some ham and deceased took a nip of whiskey in his tea. They went to Wrangaton sports, where deceased tried to hire a bicycle for the dirt track racing. He tried one and rode up and down the road, and then witness found him lying in the roadway. He complained of pains in the head, and shortly after fell down again. Later, at the Kingsbridge Road Hotel, deceased was dazed. They met William Steere, about whose neck deceased put his arms there. They stayed about 30 minutes and then proceeded to South Brent, where they remained about 20 minutes. NO Offence Taken: Witness next saw deceased at Dean Prior and when the pail of water was thrown over him, rather than take offence, he drove away. The lorries also stopped near Bourne Bridge, Dean Prior, and the next witness saw the other lorry was when it was stationary outside the Half Moon Inn. Deceased was leaning against the rear. Witness, in applying his hand brake, slightly released his foot clutch, which moved the lorry about 3 feet farther than he intended, thus crushing deceased. No other fellow-employee of deceased would go out with him, owing to his quarrelsome nature. Mr. McGahey: Were you perfectly sober? Witness: Yes, absolutely. The Coroner said in his summing up that the action of the witness William Steer, who was with the deceased just before he was killed, was to be deeply regretted. He knew the driver was drinking and admitted that when he got to the fatal spot, he knew deceased was going to fight but went into the inn to get him a drink. When if he had only been wise enough, he would have asked him to go inside. It was a most reprehensible thing. The Jury expressed appreciation of the way in which Constable Gould had given his evidence, and also considered that the witness William Steer's conduct was highly reprehensible.

The lorry "wobbled" all over the road, but eventually after about a mile, the witness passed it where the road was wider. In passing, the witness looked at the driver of the lorry who seemed to be drunk, rolling about the cab. There was somebody with him in the cab. I made up my mind to report the matter, "added witness " and at Buckfastleigh I informed a constable whom I met in the street. He accompanied me to the main road. I drove him in my car and approaching the Half Moon Inn near Ashburton I saw a lorry pull up. We stopped some yards away and saw the driver get out and walk to the rear of the lorry. Another lorry appeared and was pulling up, and the next thing we heard was a crash, and I saw a man fall on the ground. When I got there the man was lying between the two lorries, obviously seriously injured. The coroner: Assuming the second lorry to pull up was in fact the first lorry you passed on the road, was there anything to complain about in the way it was being driven? Witness: Nothing whatever. Col. Tucker: What makes you come to the conclusion that the driver of the second lorry was drunk — The erratic way in which the lorry was driven: Gerald Swain Pincent. The Nook, Tarraway Road, Paignton who was with the previous witness, gave similar evidence. The second lorry they passed was being driven very dangerously.
