On Monday the hearing of the first appeal – that in respect of Messrs. Fox, Elliott, and Co. Millbay Docks – was completed ... adjourned until some convenient date next month, when more statistical information showing the proportion of timber "worked up" in the mill for various requirements could be submitted: £363 Valuation: The second case to come before the Recorder was that in connection with the firm of Messrs. Cole Bros., timber importers, moulding manufacturers and sawmill proprietors, Prince Rock Plymouth ...

It was stated for the appellants that their premises at Prince Rock covered a total area of 62,209 square feet. In the shed were seventeen machines, worked by electricity and eleven men. Mr. F. W. Pinsent, revenue officer, said this was similar to Messrs. Fox, Elliott and Co, and he understood the work was practically the same. He was told that 60 percent of the timber passed through the mill ...

Male Nurse Drowned at Paignton: The mystery surrounding the death of Percy Cooch, aged 29, a male nurse, whose body was found in a crevice in the rocks off Preston Sands, Paignton, on Sunday, was unsolved at the inquest conducted at Torquay yesterday by Mr. G. E. Windeatt (deputy-coroner), who returned a verdict of "Found drowned." Janie Alice Nash, Seaway-arcade, Seaway-road, Preston, identified the body by a shirt and tie Cooch wore, which she purchased for him. He resided with her from 1912 to January 1929. Dr. H. C. Adams said he examined the body on the rocks at Preston. He considered the man had been dead a month. He could see no signs of violence. The probable cause of death was drowning. OUT OF WORK: William Henry Pinsent said Cooch had been living with him for some time at Totnes. He remained with him until Friday, January 10. He left the house about 6.30 p.m. that day to have supper with friends at Bridgetown. He did not return, and in January witness reported him missing to the Totnes police. He was out of work most of the time he was with witness. Charles Wills, of the Manor Inn, Preston, Paignton, said about 8.30 p.m. on January 10 Cooch came into the bar and was served with refreshment. He played a game of crib with a customer, and left again shortly after 9 p.m., telling the witness had to take a bus. Edwin Milner, of Le Bon Fish Café, Preston, said Cooch came into his cafe about 9.45 p.m. in January and had supper. He left about 10.15 p.m., saying he was going to catch the bus for Totnes. Witness saw him later, but he did not say why he had missed the bus. He appeared to be quite capable of looking after himself. When he left the witness on the last occasion, he went down Seaway-road in the direction of the sea front. Witness knew the deceased well and he appeared to be in his usual good health when he last saw him. The Deputy-Coroner, returning a verdict of "found drowned," said there was no evidence to show how Cooch got into the water. Mr. Windeatt expressed his deep sympathy with Mrs. Nash, who had had "considerable trouble with this young man."

Peeps into the Past: Moretonhampstead Events in Napoleonic Times: Contemporary Record: The local history of Moretonhampstead has been lately enriched by the discovery of a manuscript journal, kept by one Sylvester Treleaven, and covering the Napoleonic period. By the courtesy of Mr. B. Parker, permission has been given to quote from this record in this and succeeding articles. For years, from 1789 onwards, Treleaven was a shrewd and detached observer of the life the town. French prisoners of war, smugglers, weavers, itinerant preachers, hungry women, and workless men jostle one another in his pages. He is content to write of Moretonhampstead only. When peace was declared in 1801, notes it as a fact, and then goes on to say how Mr. Pinsent's house was illuminated with coloured lights, spelling "Rejoice Brittons," while the Post-office showed "Peace and Plenty." Yet he never lacked material, such was his interest in small details. When Thomas Tyrwhitt, Esquire, drove through the town on his way to his new estate at Tor Royal, Treleaven took pains to describe minutely the armorial bearings on the door of his carriage. In everything there is the same precision, and, like Pepys, he never bothered to assess the relative importance of events. City Congratulated: "One of the First Authorities to Recognize the Problem": Mrs. Pinsent, who is Chairman of the Board of Control, made a most able speech on colony life and training for the mental defectives. She congratulated the city on its enlightened public spirit. It was pleasant, she said, to report that the City of Stoke-on-Trent was one of the first local authorities to recognise the problems of the mentally deficient, and to provide some accommodation of their own. No doubt the experience they had gained at the Cloughs Institution, at Newcastle, would be valuable in the working of this larger scheme. They had great opportunities, said Mrs. Pinsent, of securing the happiness and usefulness of the future occupants of the Hall. The lot of the mental defectives left to fend for themselves in the world was a very hard one indeed. They were often made to feel their infirmity, even by their own parents, and many of their anti-social reactions and bad habits need never have been if they had received early care and attention. For that reason, she wished to ask them to admit all their colonists as young as possible: Dangers of Monotony: Most of their colonists would necessarily have to regard that as their permanent home. Possibly 5 per cent. might improve sufficiently, after long training, to take their place in the community. There were two things that could make institution life miserable—monotony and idleness. People talked a good deal about taking away the liberty of the individual, but a good many years' experience had taught her that, given plenty of variety in work and play, the feeble-minded did not feel the intense craving for personal liberty. The measure of liberty possible in the colony was quite enough to make them happy. They must never be idle or bored, and the well-run colony would have workshops and occupations which could supply the needs of all the colonists. Time must never hang heavy; in other words, when they were not at work they must be at play, speaking of the need for adequate classification, Mrs. Pinsent said that so many people made the mistake of thinking that mental defectives were all of one class and that they could be herded together in common dormitories. They must separate the higher-grade defective from those of the lower grade, for the former were often acutely sensitive of being classed with Imbeciles and idiots.

The Board of Control: Women Commissioners Appointed: The Mental Treatment Act, 1930, provides that the Board of Control shall consist of the Chairman (who FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 13, 1931, shall be a paid Commissioner) and not more than four other Commissioners, all of whom shall be paid Commissioners. These members of the Board of Control are called "Senior Commissioners," and it is stated that of the Senior Commissioners other than the Chairman, one at least shall be a legal Commissioner, two shall be medical Commissioners, and one at least shall be a woman. These Senior Commissioners are appointed by His Majesty on the recommendation, with regard to the legal Commissioners, of the Lord Chancellor, and in the case of the other Commissioners, of the Minister of Health. In addition to the Senior Commissioners, there are to be other paid Commissioners, who are appointed, subject to the approval of the Minister of Health, by' the Board of Control. The Act declares that women are to be included as well as men among these Commissioners, and that any Commissioners so appointed shall be officers of the Board. Last December we reported that the Senior Commissioners, consisting of the Chairman, Mr. Lawrence George Brock, C. B., and four other Senior Commissioners — one legal man, two medical men, and one lay woman, Mrs. Ellen Pinsent, C.B.E., had been appointed. At the same time, we said it was most regrettable that no medical woman had been appointed a member of the Board of Control. Last week The Times reported that this Board of Control, with the approval of the Minister of Health, had appointed the following to be Commissioners: Mr. A. E. Evans, M. B., D.P.H., Mr. S. E. Gill, M.D., D. P. H., Mr. E. O. Lewis, D.Sc., L. R. C. P., Mr. J. W. W. Adamson, M.D., Surgeon Rear-Admiral J. F. Hall, C.M.G., K.H.S., Surgeon Rear-Admiral E. T. Meagher — at present Medical Inspectors; and Mr. C. F. Penton, Barrister-at-Law, Miss I. M. C. Duncan, B. A., LL. B., Barrister-at-Law, Surgeon-Captain H. C. Devas, Miss I. G. H. Wilson, M.D., D.P.M., and Miss R. Darwin (part-time). We are glad to note that three women are among these Commissioners appointed by the Board of Control, including one medical woman and one-woman barrister. We are, however, by no means satisfied with the composition of the Board of Control itself, as it seems only common sense that of its two medical members one should be a woman and the other a man. The proportion of women to men among the medical Commissioners appointed by the Board is also ludicrously inadequate.

First Woman on Council: One of the pioneer workers on behalf of the mentally defective visited the scene of her former labours this week and told an audience of Birmingham men and women something of the working of the Mental Deficiency Act, its achievements, and failures. She was Mrs. Pinsent, the first woman to be elected a member of Birmingham City Council. Mrs. Pinsent has been most keenly interested in work associated with mentally defectives and as long ago as 1900 because of her work in this connection was co-opted a member of the Special Schools under the old School Board. Later, in 1902, when the Birmingham Education Committee came into being she was appointed the chairman of the Special Schools Sub-Committee and retained that position until she left the city for London in 1913. It was she, I was informed by Miss E M Barling, who first pointed out the need for special after-care work, and it was because of her keen interest and outstanding knowledge that she was appointed of the Royal Commission which inquired into the care and control of the feeble-minded. FOUR YEARS' INQUIRY: THIS commission sat for four years and

heard in that time 300 witnesses representing all classes of the community. Only recently Mrs. Pinsent retired from her position as a commissioner of the Board of Control. Her knowledge of her subject is perhaps unequalled by any other woman in the country. The first Act for dealing with the mentally defectives in this country, it is interesting to recall, was introduced in the 14th century and was known as the Statute of Prerogatives dealing with "born fools, and persons of unsound mind, with certain periods of understanding." But this only concerned persons with property. It was not until 1743 the first Act was passed dealing with pauper lunatics. By this Act, two justices could order a dangerous lunatic to be locked up and chained, if necessary.

Accident Not Reported: Sequel at Police Court: Mrs. Ethel Betty Pinsent, 1, Red Lynch House Ascot, was summoned at Windsor Petty Sessions recently for not reporting an accident in which a car she was driving was concerned at Peascod Street, Windsor, on 22nd March, as required by law. The original summons mentioned the word and this the Chief Constable asked should be amended to "damage." Mr. Coxwell, who defended, raised no objection. The plea was not guilty. Harold Toovey, Th Nursery, Datchet Road, Slough, said on 22nd March, at about 1145 a.m. he was coming up Peascod Street in a van, towards the Castle. When about opposite Messrs. Denney's shop in Lower Peascod Street, he had to stop

because of traffic congestion. Two lorries stopped in front of him and there was a stationary van on the other side of the road. Facing him there was a light car and a heavy lorry behind that. The lorries in front of him could not move, so they had to ease in as near as they could to let him through. The car driven by the defendant came through and collided with the rear off-side of his van. When he got out to look round to see what had happened, the lady had driven away. He had no opportunity of requesting her to give her name and address. Police-Constable Wastie, Berks Constabulary, Winkfield, said on 3rd April he interviewed the defendant, cautioned her and she made a statement. Mrs. Pinsent said that when she received the summons before the work "injury" had been altered to "damage" she felt perfectly dreadful, and it worried her most frightfully. Mr. Gordon Coxwell: You thought you had injured someone? Witness: I could not understand it all. It gave you a great shock. – A terrible shock. It is said an accident occurred whereby you caused damage. Did you know you had done any damage! No! Did anyone do any damage to you? No, except the wing, which was scratched. It was an old van in very bad repair, with a broken wing at the back. Some paint was scratched off my off-side front wing. Why did you not try and get hold of the van driver? Because the van had gone away. Continuing, Mrs. Pinsent said she had stopped at the time and saw the scratches, but there was no dent. It was so trivial that she did not intend to claim from anyone and paid 5s to have the scratches painted over. Having told the Bench there was a traffic block in Peascod Street, the defendant said she stopped behind the stationary car thinking there was no room to go on. A pedestrian stepped on the pavement and beckoned her through. She still thought there was no room and did not proceed. The pedestrian again beckoned and looked very annoyed because she did not go through. She started to go through very, very slowly in bottom gear and as she was doing so the other car, driven by Mr. Toovey, instead of waiting, also started to go through. Mr. Toovey's car bumped into the mudguard of her car. She stopped immediately but Toovey pulled right over her mudguard. She got out to see what was wrong, saw that the wing was just scratched and that no damage could possibly have been caused to any other vehicle or person. She was agitated because she thought her car was making greater congestion by remaining and she thought the best thing was to drive on again. No one made signs for her to stop and no one asked her any questions. To her knowledge she had not caused any damage to any person and thought there was no necessity to report the incident. This was her tenth year of driving, and she had a clean license. In answer to the Chief Constable Mrs. Pinsent said she had heard Mr. Toovey state that his car was stationary. The Chief Constable: do you know he remained stationary for fifteen minutes after the accident? Mrs. Pinsent: No. do you know he reported to a Police Constable on the spot and particulars were taken down there? No. Mr. Gordon Coxwell drew attention to the form of the summons. He did not like to make a fuss, but it had very much upset this lady because she thought she really had caused injury to Mr. Toovey. Mr. Toovey had since been into the box and could not identify the lady or the car. The Justices Clerk: There is no dispute about the fact that she was there: Conflict of Evidence: Mr.

Coxwell: It all seems so curious. The man says he was stationary. It is only his evidence against hers. On her part she says he was not stationary but came through and struck her car. The Justices Clerk: A direct conflict of evidence. Mr. Coxwell stated there was the further fact that Mrs. Pinsent had sworn she did not know any damage had taken place. She stopped and did not race on. She looked at the car and found a small scratch and thought "it is nothing". It was only one person against the other. The mayor said the Bench found the case proved. The Chief Constable said he did not press for an endorsement of the license. Mrs. Pinsent had a ten year's clean license. The mayor said the case would be dismissed under the P.O.A. on payment of £1 costs.

The Winchester City Council debated, on the report of the Electricity Committee, the question of overhead and underground electric cables within the city area, and particularly in the added rural area. The decisions were taken on two paragraphs in the report. The first referred to Dean Lane, which is developing as a residential area, and the Electricity Committee's policy there has been one of overhead cable, with the exception of a short length. The Committee recommended that the work be completed as originally approved. The policy was attacked from the point of view of the preservation of the amenities of the district, and it was argued that if overhead wires were allowed it would depreciate the property value. The other side, presented in figures by Major Pinsent, was that underground cables meant three or four times the initial cost. After a long debate the definite recommendation, which permits overhead cable, was referred back by 12 votes to nine. The question of adopting a hard and fast rule prohibiting overhead cables anywhere within the City boundary was raised on another minute, which stated that the Committee inform the Winchester Branch of the Council for the Preservation of Rural England that the Committee feel at the present juncture they cannot give an undertaking to alter their policy, which is to put all cables underground "wherever the revenue to be derived there from permits." All speakers voiced a desire to preserve amenities but were not prepared to bind the Council to a hard-and-fast prohibition of overhead cables. The motion to refer the matter back was rejected by 12 votes to seven.

Veale outbid him again in 1656, giving £90, and obtained a five years' lease which was extended, until in 1677 Pinsent secured them for £120 One interesting entry in these leases is that in 1688 the grazing of the Sporting

Place was rented to Veale except one acre, which had been granted to the School House, thus chronicling the commencement of the Grammar School, which was founded by John Pinsent about this date. Education seems to have been coming to the fore during the Commonwealth, for in 1658 the seven men recorded that there was great need of an able and painful schoolmaster in the place, and they agreed with Mr. Pollexfen to come and reopen the old school in the Church House for £13 6s 8d. yearly, on their part undertaking to put the premises into repair for him.

Tribute to Sir Richard Pinsent: The general report announces the impending resignation from the committee of Sir Richard Pinsent, whose record, it states, is unique in the history of the solicitors' profession in the city and exceptional in that of the country. Sir Richard was admitted as a solicitor in 1873. He was president of the Birmingham Law Society from 1901 to 1903 and again in 1926-27. In 1918-19 he was president of the Law Society for England and Wales. In 1913 he was elected a member of the Disciplinary Committee of the Law Society, and in 1928 he became its chairman, an office which he held until his resignation in 1938. The report places on record appreciation of the noteworthy services he has rendered the profession. Membership of the society is now 466, an increase of six. A register of practices is now kept, and already contains information of considerable historical interest. It has been used to assist in tracing documents prepared by solicitors or firms no longer in practice. The committee calls the attention of members to the advisability of placing old deeds and records in the local authorised repositories, where they will be cared for and made available for the historian.
