Sydney Gazette and New South Wales Advertiser (NSW: 1803-1842): Saturday 17th February 1821

On Wednesday arrived from England, with a valuable cargo of merchandize, the ship Midas, Mr. Joseph Underwood, Owner and Commander. She sailed from England on the 12th of August last; called at the Cape of Good Hope the 15th November, which she left in seven days; touched at the Derwent the 12th January, and sailed for Port Jackson the 4th instant: Passengers; Mrs. Joseph Underwood and family; Miss E. Jenkins, Miss S. Jenkins; Mr. Robt. Young; Mr. D. W. Stalker; Dr. T. Lansdale, Surgeon of the ship; Mr. J. C. Underwood Mr. Thomas Hughes; Mr. G. F. Hamilton; Mr. Thomas Harpur; Mr. E. Williams: Also, Mr. N. Lawrence; Mr. Pinsent, wife, and three children; Mrs. Raycraft; Mrs. Williams; and Mrs. Mellish.

The Gleaner (Sydney, NSW: 1827): Saturday 18th August 1827

Supreme Criminal Court: ... James Davison was indicted for stealing three bullocks and two cows, the property of Richard Cobcroft, at Wilberforce on the 12th of June last ... *(description of case and guilty verdict)* ... This circumstance brings to our recollection a shocking instance of “avaricious depravity,” which occurred in Devonshire, about thirty-five years ago. An affluent farmer, named “Pinsent” in the neighbourhood of Dartmouth, and whom we well knew, was clearly convicted at the Assizes at Exeter, of having “stolen a sheep from a poor man, who was his tenant!!” Strong intercession was made and powerful interest exerted on his behalf; - but the Judge viewing the cruelty, and atrocity of the case, (paralleled only by that finely portrayed in Nathan’s parable to David,) was justly inexorable! The wretched culprit suffered the extreme penalty of the Law, leaving an only daughter, then an amiable girl of about fourteen years of age, heiress to a fortune amounting at least to £30,000!!

CHARLES DURRANT'S DEATH: The investigation into the circumstances connected with this man's death has resulted in a committal of Mr. Beilby to appear at the ensuing or such subsequent criminal sessions of the Supreme Court, to be holden at Melbourne, as the crown prosecutor shall direct, to answer to charge of having, on the 21st May, killed, one Charles Durrant by shooting and discharging a certain pistol loaded with gun-powder and leaden balls at and against the right side of the said Charles Durrant, thereby inflicting a mortal wound of which the said Charles Durrant instantly died. Mr. Beilby was admitted to bail, himself in £200, and Thomas Pinsent Scott and Alfred Henry Bates, Esquires, in £100 each: Portland Gazette:
