Our Constitution: We have been favored with further accounts from Natal, now, from a combination of material and social questions a colony, that will in all probability become an African Victoria. Diamondiferous in opposition to auriferous, already the white population has more than doubled within eighteen months; steamers from all quarters of the Globe are chartered to convey passengers, and no end of wagons, elegantly fitted up with all conveniences for a nine day's journey, start daily from Cape Town ...

We leave the Diamond fields and come at once to the consideration of a question, which nevertheless notwithstanding the angry denial of a correspondent, has its analogue in the Representative form of Government obtaining in West Australia. That form of Government was established in Natal in 1856, and until recently both the Executive and Legislative branches of the Hybrid constitution had worked harmoniously--that is to say the Executive had it all their own way, and jobbed the revenue petty much as they pleased. ...

One public work was imperatively called for in consequence of the greatly increased traffic with the interior, a bridge over the Tudela River. The Council passed a resolution that a loan was required and moved an address to the Governor praying that he would be pleased to initiate a bill, and that they (the Council) would make provision for the payment of interest, and payment of principal. To this constitutional request Mr. KEATE gave a positive refusal, and dissolved the Council. - Of that Council, consisting of twelve, two voted with the Government against the loan. The scene of the contest was Durban the capital of the colony-the polling being for the opposition members, Churchill, 316; Sanderson, 307; Government Members, Robinson, 109; Pinsent, 106. Meetings were held all over the colony, and resolutions passed supporting the action of the opposition. ...

A deputation will be sent to Downing-Street to represent the cause of the Legislature and contend for the right of control over the finances of the colony. Whether, under our "hybrid constitution," such a power will be vested in our representatives, so as to have practical effect must now be determined and defined. ...

Juvenile Exhibition: Fitzroy Contributors: Fitzroy and Collingwood will not be behind hand in contributing to the success of the exhibition, and we only regret that an exhibition on a small scale, such as held at Brunswick, was not held between the two cities, so that the juveniles could have shown their proficiency to their local friends and fellow citizens before launching their ventures upon the wide-wide world. These remarks are called forth by a visit we made during the week to Mr. Pinsent's bakery in the Alexandra-parade, who, after our business arrangements had been settled, invited us to inspect some work his son, just out of his time, had completed for the Exhibition. The two exhibits must have taken months, if not a year or two, to complete, because Mr. Pinsent, jun., being but an apprentice, could only work at these specimens during his spare time, of an evening, or on holidays in a little workshop his father has put up for him. The ambition and the energy displayed will be understood when it is stated that the larger specimen of handicraft is on a plate of glass 7ft. by 5ft. and the smaller one on a plate 5ft by 3 ft. Mr. Pinsent was apprenticed to Mr. H. Ward, and the proficiency attained reflects much credit both on the instruction given by the master and on the assiduous attention paid to the lessons by the apprentice.

The exhibits are two framed handsome specimens of writing and decorating on glass. The smaller of the two is an entablature (with writing) supported by two pillars on each side relieved by figures on the summit and at the base of each, while under the centre of the entablature is a well-executed copy of the Victorian Coat of Arms. This was finished in 1877, and although very excellent in its way, and quite fit to put to shame many professors of the art (for it is beyond the mere mechanical work of trade), yet the more ambitious work of two years later quite puts it in the shade, and shows that vast improvement, nay almost perfection, can be attained by practice and perseverance in so short a time as two years; and that only in that very time that is so often wasted by our colonial youth lounging round street-corners, or by making them selves a nuisance to every one about them. These specimens are the best sermon of the value of home

influences and home society that anyone could wish to have delivered to them, for the boy would never have stopped at home to work as he has done, if he had not been encouraged and sympathized with in his efforts to improve himself, and we say this, not alone of this particular exhibit, but of all. Where the Parents do not neglect their duty, where they make their home, be it ever so humble as homelike as possible, the young Victorians will amply repay any little trouble they may have occasioned, and instead of being a curse to their parents, a nuisance to there neighbours and the *mauvais sujets* of the Police, they will be the comfort and pride of their parents, and will earn the respect and esteem of their townspeople. The larger picture (so we may call it) contains in the centre the Royal Coat of Arms, the Garter motto being suspended on a ribbon across it. There is an ornamental circle round it situated in no less than five distinct borders, displaying much originality and elegance of design, executed in a most artistic and workmanlike manner the choice of colors and metals with their harmonies and contrasts being "worked in" most efficiently.

Mr. Pinsent has already taken two medals, certificates and pecuniary prizes at the Exhibition at Sandhurst and Ballarat. He has also sent some smaller designs for competition to Geelong, and we heartily wish him and all other aspiring Victorian youth the success they are so ardently striving to gain. It is not every one who strives that wins a prize, but when all enter into an honorable competition, we hope they will let no petty jealousies arise when the best man wins but when the victor's brow is crowned with the wreath let one and all join in the shout "*Palmant qui maruuit ferat*".
