Hairdressers v. Fitzroy Trades: This match was played on Thursday at the Fitzroy Cricket Ground and resulted in a win for Hairdressers by six runs - the scores being Hairdressers 64; of which Bught made 13 and Richardson 10. Pinsent and Topping bowled well for Fitzroy Trades, the former taking 7 wickets for 28, and the latter 3 for 26. Fitzroy Trades made 58 of which Pinsent made 15, and Topping 12. FORGING AND UTTERING: A German named John Kiel was presented for forging and uttering a cheque drawn on the Brunswick-street branch of the London Chartered Bank of Australia for £1 17s 6d, purporting to be signed T. J. Pinsent, sign writer, Fitzroy. The evidence of several witnesses showed that on the 15<sup>th</sup> instant the prisoner went to the bank and tried to cash the cheque. The clerk had doubts about it, and called the manager Mr. Smith, who went to Mr. Pinsent's house where he was told that the cheque was a forgery. Prisoner then said he had bought off a man in Gertrude-street a pawn ticket for a coat in the pocket of which he found the cheque. Not knowing that it was a forgery he presented the cheque for payment. This statement was to some extent corroborated by the pawnbroker Samuels, with whom the coat had been pledged by a man whom, he said, had only one arm, and it was redeemed by the prisoner next day. He was committed to take his trial at the General Sessions to take place on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of October next.

Uttering Counterfeit coin: Petter Killien, who pleaded not guilty on the previous day on a charge of uttering counterfeit coin was brought up for trial. ...

Mark Gray, a blind man, and an inmate of the New Town Charitable Institution, said prisoner had also been an inmate of the institution. He often bought small things from witness, and about September 17 he purchased goods - tobacco, matches, and oranges, to the value of 1s., giving witness a 2s. piece in payment, and receiving 1s. change. Some four days previous to that prisoner bought 3d. worth of goods from witness, gave a 2s piece in payment and received 1s. 9d. change. Put the coins in a small bag with another 2s. piece and gave one of the coins to a messenger with which to buy him something from Hobart. The messenger looked at it and it was bad. Then gave him the other coin he received from prisoner, and that also was bad. The third 2s piece was good, and witness gave it to the messenger. Took, the two bad coins to prisoner, who told him not to show them about, and he would give him good ones in their place. Prisoner was going out and said he would bring back the good money with him. Witness: interviewed prisoner again about an hour later and received a repetition of the promise. Heard nothing more of him until he met him before the magistrate. Gave the bad coins to Mr. Pearce, a warder. John Pinsent, another inmate of the New Town Institution, said he saw prisoner and Gray to gather on September 18. Gray, gave prisoner four figs of tobacco, a pennyworth of matches and pennyworth of lollies, worth 1s., in exchange, for a 2s. piece. The coins produced were not the same, they were darker in colour. Prisoner, when asked if he wished to cross-examine the witness, said he had, nothing to say if the oath of a man like that were taken! Martin Tolmaine, messenger at the New Town Institution corroborated the witness Gray's evidence as to the tender to him of the bad coins. ...

The jury returned a verdict of guilt with a recommendation to mercy. His Honor in passing sentence said prisoner was a ticket of leave man and appeared to have been almost all his life in gaol. He would be imprisoned for 10 months ...
