The Snell Will Case: Alleged Forgery: How the will was signed: A Joke and how it was taken: Extraordinary Evidence: The action to test the validity of the will of the late Horatio Abraham Nelson Snell, furniture dealer, of North Fitzroy, who died on October 4, 1897, was continued yesterday in the Banco Court before Mrs. Justice Holroyd. The will was dated August 19 1897, and by it the testator bequeathed the whole of his property to his wife Mansell Maria Sinclair, and his children, with the exception of a house in David Street, Fitzroy, which is left to his sisters, Rosina and Victoria Snell. ...

... immediately after the death of Snell a will was found but proved to be unsigned. A second will was found subsequently but was not proceeded with. The third will, which is now propounded by Mansell Maria Sinclair, is opposed by Miss Victoria Frances Snell, sister of the deceased ...

“MRS” SNELLS EVIDENCE: Mansell Maria Sinclair, examined by Mr. Hogan said: “I lived with the deceased, Mr. Snell as his wife for 22 years and had six children by him, five of whom are living while one is dead. I was always on good terms with Mr. Snell. About two months before he died Mr. Snell spoke to me about a will and told me that the children and I were well provided for. Several times before this he told me that I should never want. Mr. Snell had two sisters Rosina Augusta and Victoria Frances. They hadn't lived at Mr. Snell's house for 15 years. He used to say that he was heartbroken with them and that they had ruined him. One of them used to mind the shop for him. About a week before Mr. Snell's death, I had a conversation with Mr. Pinsent who took me down to see Mr. Best solicitor. Mr. Best said that he could do nothing for me”. Mr. Hogan – “Why?” Witness – “Because I had no marriage lines. I found one will, but it proved to be no good. I know that it was a will because it was written on a will form ...
