Ora Pinsent is married, but her husband is a "ne'er-do-weel," and the man she ought to marry is, happily for himself, otherwise engaged. The women of the story do not like Ora, and the attitude is more than justified by the lady's behaviour; and of the men of the story, there is only one with whom the general reader will have much genuine sympathy. ...
