A Dairyman Prosecuted: Interesting Case at Ashfield: Arthur Kench, an inspector under, the Pure Foods Act, proceeded against Joseph Pinsent, a dairyman, of Canterbury, at the Ashfield Court, upon an information alleging that, on January 6, he sold milk which was not of the nature, substance, or quality demanded. Defendant pleaded not guilty. Complainant stated that at about 5.15 a.m. on January 6 he was purchasing a sample of milk in George-street, Canterbury, in which street defendant's dairy premises were situated. He saw defendant leave his dairy in a cart and came towards him. Defendant looked at him, and then jumped off the cart, picked up a can which was on the front of the cart, and took it into the dairy. A few minutes afterwards he returned without the can. Witness purchased a sample of milk from him and then told him that he had better go back with him to the dairy, as he wished to purchase a sample of the milk from the can he took from the cart. Defendant went back with him, but before reaching the dairy, left him,

and went down by the side of the fence, while witness entered by the front. He met defendant near the milk room, which they entered.

He asked defendant where the can, which he took from the cart, was, and he took a can, from a shelf, and handed it to him. Defendant said the can was leaking. Witness examined it and found it quite dry. In a scullery at the rear of the milk room witness saw another can of milk, and asked defendant if that was the one he took from the cart, and he said it was not, that it was skimmed milk. Witness took a sample of the milk. Later on, he went to the house and saw Mrs. Pinsent. He showed her his authorities under the Pure Foods and Dairies Supervision Act. and told her he wanted to look through the house. Just inside the kitchen door he saw a can containing about three gallons of milk. He asked her where she got the milk, and she said that defendant had given it to her after milking that morning. He asked her if it was in the same condition as when taken from the cow, and she said it was. He then tendered her 2 ½ d and asked her to supply him with a pint of milk, but she said it was not for sale and refused to give it him. He then took a pint, and divided it into three portions, one of which he handed to Mrs. Pinsent, and another he submitted to the Government Analyst. He had since received from the Government Analyst a certificate showing that the milk had been adulterated by the addition of 8.24 per cent of water. After hearing further evidence, and without calling on defendant, the magistrate said that, although the case was of very grave suspicion, there was not sufficient evidence to enable him to convict, and he must therefore dismiss the information, but without costs.

The Feeble-Minded: Mr. Bramwell Booth, writing oh the subject, says: — 'Enganius' says that what we most need is to check the production of the feeble-minded. Exactly! And in order to do that we must get control of them. It is one of the most distressing facts of the situation that the present lack of control is largely responsible for the lamentable increase in their number. We have lately had under the oversight of our departments a feeble-minded girl of 22, who had previously given birth to five illegitimate children, and an unmarried woman of 40 who had 12 Children, eight, of whom are alive. (Mr. Plowden might find food for thought, in these cases. Most of us know similar ones some time or other in our lives). Mrs. Hume Pinsent, writing in the 'Nineteenth Century and after,' says: “We want to prevent, the birth of such people (the feeble-minded), and continuous segregation of the mentally defective is the chief means of doing so. It appears that the birth-rate among defectives is unusually high, and though the death rate is also high, there can be no doubt that the number of degenerate survivors is large.” (*On the evidence before her, Mrs. Pinsent found that much feeble-mindedness was of an inherited character, though she admits that many feeble-minded children, being trained, can be taught to rise above the merely animal level.*)

SOCIETY AND THE UNFIT: While the world of work has been wrangling about wages, the clergy and laymen of the Established Church have been reviewing many social problems at Cambridge. The 50th anniversary of the Church Congress has been held in the University town this week. The debate upon the care of the feeble-minded was full of human interest. It was inaugurated by Dr. G. Shuttleworth who dwelt upon the necessity for detecting early and protection always”. A brilliant address was delivered by Mrs. Hume Pinsent, a member of the Royal Commission on the Care of the Feeble-minded. Mrs. Pinsent advocated the segregation of the unfit. She observed that the altruism of the 19th and 20th centuries was lowering the general standard of humanity. The lowest types were tended, the higher neglected. Mrs. Pinsent illustrated her argument from the histories of mentally defective families in which mental defects and criminal propensities could be traced through three or four generations. The cost of such families to the community was very large. Fourteen individuals in one family had been supported at public expense in industrial schools, reformatories, workhouses, asylums, and homes. They passed continually from one of these institutions to another, with short intervals of liberty, during which they reproduced their kind. Five publicly paid officials were continually visiting one other family, where a mentally deficient (mother had produced ten children, four of whom were mentally defective and two physically defective, while three died in infancy. Yet good, efficient citizens were being heavily rated and taxed to provide training and ultimate support for these degenerate families. The result was that good citizens were led to limit the number of their children and also the educational opportunities they could afford then, thereby reducing their efficiency.

MONSTROUS LAW FEES: A resolution advocating complete fusion of barristers and solicitors was carried at a special meeting of the Law Society (solicitors) in London recently. It was decided to take a poll of all the members on the subject. Mr. H P. Gisborne, mover of the resolution, said the barristers would be in a very difficult position if, as a body, they voted against the proposal, which would be a benefit to the public. An amendment by Mr. James Dodd, that solicitors, as well as barristers, should have audience in all courts, was defeated. Mr. Dodd said the Bar had ruined the profession of the law by its extortions. He had a case in which counsel threatened to strike unless given an outrageous and exorbitant "refresher". If that were the honour of the Bar, it must have sunk pretty low. Mr. Kennedy condemned the "monstrous and exorbitant fees" charged by counsel. In 1000 undefended cases in the last two sittings of the Divorce Court the solicitors had to employ barristers. Many of the parties were poor women, and solicitors were compelled to drag out of them fees for counsel. The president, Mr. Pinsent, said the attitude of the council of the Law Society towards the Bill providing for women lawyers could not be stated until the Bill had been put before Parliament. The president also appealed for a fund of £100,000, of which over £10,000 has been promised, for a war memorial to solicitors and articled clerks. During the meeting a woman was seen in the hall, and members cried, "Let her be removed." It was pointed out that she was a Press representative, and she was allowed to remain.
